HOPKINTON RESIDENT NAMED NEW HAMPSHIRE HISTORICAL SOCIETY VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR

CONCORD, NH—The New Hampshire Historical Society has named Jeff Dalzell of Hopkinton its 2011 Volunteer of the Year.

Dalzell, an architect with degrees from Williams College and the Harvard School of Architecture, was recognized for volunteering his time and expertise to lead the Society through a space needs evaluation and long-range facilities planning study. For several months Dalzell helped to evaluate various potential space reconfigurations at the Society's library and museum buildings in Concord. His work included the study of collections storage, exhibition, library, and office areas. He also reviewed the results of engineering studies for energy conservation and risk mitigation.
