Abstract:

This large photograph collection of approximately 1,900 images centers on Concord, NH, in the late nineteenth and early twentieth century. It documents with dates and specific locations neighborhoods, businesses, events, individual homes, government buildings, as well as parades and similar celebrations. People present in the images are often identified, but there are only a few portraits, and the presence of people is usually incidental to the building or occasion photographed.

Access and Use

Acquisition Information and Provenance:

George W. Perry collected these photographs, pasted them in scrapbooks, and annotated them. The scrapbooks were a gift of May Nutter on October 2, 1974.

Processing Information:

This collection was initially processed at an unknown date by an unknown person. The scrapbooks were then disassembled at an unknown time and the photographs dispersed in the Photograph Collection. The photographs were cut out from their pages and an unknown amount of information was lost during this process, with many images not identified with the scrapbook they came from. This collection was reassembled and reprocessed in February 2015 by Sandra L. Wheeler. The finding aid was written by Sandra L. Wheeler in June 2015 and reformatted and updated by Korrena Cowing in February 2023. This finding aid follows the standards set forth by *Describing Archives: A Content Standard*.

Two copies of *George W. Perry Scrapbooks Inventories* have been placed with this collection. These volumes were formerly shelved as 977.8b C744p.

Access Restrictions:

Available for research. The photographic prints in this collection have been digitized and are available on the New Hampshire Historical Society's online catalog.

Location:

The collection is housed at the New Hampshire Historical Society in Concord, New Hampshire.

Physical Characteristics and Technical Requirements:

The bulk of materials in this collection are paper based and have no special technical requirements for use. Use of the film negatives requires a lightbox for viewing.

Biographical Information:

George W. Perry (1891-1971) was born in Concord, NH, on June 13, 1891 to LaForrest C. Perry and Lillian Follansbee. He married Elmira "Myra" Elizabeth Putnam on February 21, 1918 in Concord, NH. Myra was born on July 22, 1893 in Concord, NH, to Frank S. Putnam and Nattie Hubbard. They lived in Penacook, NH.

George Perry was a photographer with Kimball Studio in Concord, ran a photograph studio on Pleasant Street in Concord, and was active in many civic organizations. This includes memberships to the Blazing Star Masonic Lodge; Trinity Royal Arch Chapter; Horace Chase Council, RSM; Mount Horeb Commandry, Knights Templar; the Alpha Lodge of Perfection; Ariel Council, Princes of Jerusalem; Acacia Chapter, Rose Croix; the New Hampshire Consistory; Bektash Temple Shrine; A Patrol; Epiphany Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star; the New Hampshire Society of Veteran Free Masons; the New Hampshire Historical Society; and the Contoocook Improvement Association.

Elmira Perry died on November 29, 1959 in Merrimack, NH. George W. Perry died September 19, 1971 in a Littleton hospital, and is buried in Blossom Hill Cemetery in Concord, NH.

Collection Scope and Content Note:

George W. Perry collected approximately 1,900 images, which he then placed into a number of scrapbooks. The images are mostly of Concord, NH, but also include a few nearby towns, such as Bow, Hopkinton, and Penacook, NH. He was interested primarily in residential homes and neighborhoods, as well as in the built structures of the greater Concord area, which include stores, factories, hotels, government buildings, schools, libraries, parks, and cemeteries. Along the way, he also collected images of celebrations, mostly parades and similar public events.

The photographs cluster in the 1880-1915 time period, though there are also some images from before and after. Perry annotated the photographs, sometimes at great length. He provided location (often specific street addresses) and date of the photograph. For some buildings, he gave the history of its construction and, if applicable, its demolition. Also included are biographies of home and business owners and even of individuals whose gravestones were photographed in cemeteries.

As rich as this information is, there are surprising gaps in what Perry documented. There is no coverage of political campaigns, though sitting officials are occasionally present and identified in celebratory images, or of American participation in any of the wars during the period for which he was collecting (Spanish-American, World War I, World War II). Civil War veterans are shown marching in parades, but otherwise no attention is paid to them or to monuments celebrating their service. The depressions of the 1870s, 1890s, and 1930s are not addressed in any way.

The homes and neighborhoods he was interested in were those of the traditional white elites; working class housing is included only incidentally in larger composed images such as aerial photographs. This collection is not a place to seek depictions of poverty, immigrant populations, or working class people except as they are seen incidentally (construction workers removing snow or employees lined up outside their workplace), nor does it include depictions of rural life (farms, farm work) unless of hotels or summer cottages in the country. There are only a few portraits and images of children, unless they are seen in a larger spectator group for events.

Boxes 14 through 16 consist of negatives that belonged to George W. Perry. These negatives cover similar topics to the scrapbooks, focusing primarily on places and events in Concord, NH, with some images of surrounding towns, the White Mountains, and formal portraits. The majority of these images are identified. Of note are several folders of film negatives documenting the damage to Concord after the flood/hurricane of September 21, 1938.

Descriptions of the images in each scrapbook are as follows:

Scrapbook 1: Perkins Inn contains images of the exterior of Perkins Inn in Hopkinton, NH; the surrounding area; transportation to the inn, including the Concord Coach and the Inn's buckboard; and guest groups and activities.

Scrapbook 3: Clippings from Concord Monitor consists of clippings and a photocopied page. The photocopied page contains clippings from July 13 and July 27, 1956. These clippings include information on the razing and auction of equipment from the Margaret Pillsbury Hospital in Concord, NH. The page also includes one image of T. R. Langdell, auctioneer, at the auction. Other items include aerial views of the Concord thru-pass, cut from the June 1949 issue of New Hampshire Highways magazine.

Scrapbook 6: Jackman & Lang contains scenes of Concord that are wide-ranging and eclectic. There are groups of people, buildings identified by address or business, parks, vehicles, accidents, floods, snow storms, and other disasters. There are also a few images of nearby towns, such as Bow and Boscawen, NH.

Scrapbook 7: Abbot-Downing. The Abbot-Downing Company was a Concord factory that built wagons. It is especially known for the Concord Coach. Images in this scrapbook are of various factory buildings and iterations, sometimes with people lined up in front. There are also many images of the Concord Coach in various places, and a few of the Downing homes.

Scrapbook 8: Sesquicentennial Parade contains many scrapbook pages that feature more than one image. The New Hampshire Sesquicentennial was celebrated June 21, 1938. These are pictures of floats, marching groups, military vehicles. Sponsors of the floats are identified, along with descriptions of them. Marching groups are also identified.

Scrapbook 9: St. Paul's School contains images of the school and its surrounding countryside, with photos of buildings under construction as well as completed. There are no students or faculty shown.

Scrapbook 10: 150th Anniversary, 200th Anniversary contains images of parades celebrating Concord's settlement, and includes marching groups, floats, vehicles, and bunting-draped buildings. Groups and floats photographed are identified. The 150th anniversary was in 1915, the 200th in 1927.

Scrapbook 11: Residential Houses contains images of private homes in Concord, NH. Street addresses are given and owners named and often identified regarding what business or profession the male head of house was engaged in. Sometimes the history of the building is narrated. The date the photo was taken is often provided. Some photos show people on porches or in front of the building.

Scrapbook 12: Early Concord Homes contains images of private homes. Many but not all are named and dated; for some, a history of the structure is given. Street addresses are usually, but not always provided. There is also an image of a 1726 Range Stone marking a lot reserved for the Minister.

Scrapbook 12A: Concord Residences contains images of houses in Concord, NH, and most include information on the street address, owner name, and date of photograph. Sometimes there is extensive history of the house.

Scrapbook 13: Churches contains photographs of Protestant and Catholic Church buildings in Concord and a few in nearby Hopkinton and Canterbury, NH, including some interiors and views of organs, altars, and stained glass windows. There are no Jewish Temples. There are also three images of residential houses that have no obvious connection to the churches.

Scrapbook 14: Schools contains images of Concord schools, though this group does not include St. Paul's School [see scrapbook 9]. Schools are named and street addresses given. There are groups of students (almost all identified): graduating classes, teams, clubs. There are also a few classroom interiors and images documenting the 1958 demolition of the 'fourth high school.' Also includes an image of the 'French Catholic Church.'

Scrapbook 15: New Hampshire National Guard contains images of uniformed men on parade and in encampments. Several are images of individuals on horseback. A few of those in encampments have women visitors present.

Scrapbook 17: Gayeties of the Eighties contains images of subjects that apparently George Perry thought were typical of the 1880s. There are room interiors (including an 'artist's studio'), horse drawn vehicles, bicycles and cycling groups and clubs, theatrical performers, and people at leisure.

Scrapbook 18: Business Buildings of Concord. The buildings are identified by street address and the name of the larger entity if they are part of a 'block' [as in "Exchange Block"]. Store names are self-evident from signs. For some buildings, name and dates of the builder or first owner and history of the building are given, and when a building was later demolished this is noted. Almost none of the images contain people.

Scrapbook 20: Streets of Concord contains a mix of mostly residential, but also a few commercial buildings, viewed individually and from afar. Streets and intersecting streets are identified. For some images, the name of the owner of the building and occasionally the history of the building or individual is supplied. Most photographs are dated; if the building depicted had been razed when Perry compiled the scrapbooks, this is noted.

Scrapbook 21: State House and Grounds contains images of the State House in several iterations, with both overall and detail shots (including close ups of railings, lamps, and the statue of Pierce) and a few interior scenes of offices and chambers. Most of the images are dated. No people are depicted. See also Scrapbook 46.

Scrapbook 22: New Hampshire State Hospital and Grounds. The State Hospital, also known as the New Hampshire Asylum, is viewed from several perspectives. Several individual buildings and areas on the grounds are identified (the pond, the summer house, and named buildings). No people are evident; most but not all images are dated.

Scrapbook 24: Freshets and Floods contains pictures of floods but despite the title, the folders also include images of snow storms, fires and the aftermath of floods (buildings collapsed, etc.). Locations are identified. Often people are shown in front of the water or shoveling snow.

Scrapbook 25: Conflagrations contains photographs of fires, which are all dated, often to a specific day, and locations given. Some are of the fire itself with firemen in action; some are of the ruined building afterwards. Some pages contain multiple images. See also scrapbook 52 for newspaper clippings of fires in the 1950s and 1960s.

Scrapbook 26: Concord Fire Department contains images of the Department's buildings, vehicles, and personnel, many formally posed or on parade. Companies are named, people are identified in most, but not all images are dated. For action shots, see Scrapbook 25.

Scrapbook 27: Main Streets consists entirely of images of Main Street in Concord, with intersecting or nearby streets, the direction in which the camera is looking, and many commercial buildings identified. Captions also specify subdivisions of the street (north, south). There are also aerial shots. Most images are dated.

Scrapbook 28: Old North Burying Ground contains very clear photographs of headstones in the cemetery. Perry also provides a transcription of information on the stone and in most cases a supplementary biography of the person in question, apparently taken from the obituary. There are also several images and a history of the Quaker Cemetery, which had only two stones, one of which is inscribed with 16 names. Most of the pages have been trimmed on the sides, which has removed part of the captions.

Scrapbook 29: Cemeteries contains photographs of other Concord cemeteries: Blossom Hill, Horse Hill, Millville, St. Paul's, and Stickney Hill. As in the scrapbook for the Old North Burying Ground, the images of the gravestones are clear and Perry provides brief biographies. This is clearly a limited selection, however, as there are many fewer for each location. For these cemeteries, he also provides a few pictures of cemetery gates and features such as a chapel.

Scrapbook 30: Rivers and Bridges contains images mostly of bridges, occasionally when they were under construction. There are also views of dams. All are identified and most are dated, as are the few general views of rivers.

Scrapbook 31: Stores and Shops contains images of store fronts and interiors, many with owners and employees. Addresses are given and sometimes a brief biography of the store owner is also provided. There are also street views showing several shops.

Scrapbook 32: Commercial Establishments contains images of various manufacturing businesses, along with a few stables. Addresses are given, with the date of the photograph and date of razing of the building(s) pictured. Occasionally workers are lined up in front of the buildings.

Scrapbook 33: Parks contains images of parks and includes their date and identifies the feature within the park. A few photos contain people enjoying the park.

Scrapbook 34: Plantation of Penacook contains a few images of old Penacook, also known as West Concord, including the Sugar Ball (a flat plain), monuments (taken from far away, inscriptions not legible), and the town pound (a stone enclosure).

Scrapbook 35: Miscellaneous contains photographs of a wide variety of topics, including political campaigns of Theodore Roosevelt and Franklin Roosevelt, as well as aerial views of Concord, grist mills, circuses, post offices, quarry workers, etc. All are dated, and some contain additional information about the subject of the image.

Scrapbook 36: Public Library consists mainly of photos of Concord's Main Public Library on Green Street, with a few photos of other libraries in the city. The Green Street area is shown before the library, which is shown under construction and finished, with both exterior and interior views. Images are dated. No people are present.

Scrapbook 37: Concord State Fair consists of dated photographs that document activities at various Concord State Fairs, including bands playing, politicians appearing, horse racing, rides, and exhibits. Crowds are shown in many images.

Scrapbook 38: Parades and Concord Events. Most of these events and parades are dated and sometimes the location from which the photograph was taken is indicated. Most contain crowd scenes. The images cover parades for various holidays, including a Circus Parade, Columbus Day Parade, Flag Day Parade, and Patriots Holiday Parade. Also includes images of various events, like Old Home Week and the Winter Carnival. See also Scrapbooks 8, 10, and 50.

Scrapbook 39: Lucknow--Melvin Village NH [aka: Castle in the Clouds, Moultonborough, NH] contains images of the interior, exterior, and surrounding landscape of Lucknow, a mansion built high in the New Hampshire Mountains in 1913-1914 by Thomas G. Plant (1859-1941). Since 2006, it has been a museum and venue for meetings and events. Photographs are undated but seem to have been taken in the early years of the house. There are also many images of the Bald Peak Colony Club, also built by Plant on adjacent property. It had a hotel and cottages as well as a golf course, images of which are included. There are photos of the golf grounds and golf matches with onlookers and identified golfers.

Scrapbook 40: Prisons consists of images of various iterations of New Hampshire State Prisons, including exteriors and interiors of cell blocks and workshops. One image shows prisoners lined up outside the building.

Scrapbook 45: One package of loose leaves tied in a bundle on Concord Topics is a miscellaneous scrapbook, with dated items that include government buildings, parades and fairs, businesses, hospitals, libraries, transportation, and an image documenting an 1878 'prank' in which 'young scamps' disinterred the body of an executed murderer and hung it in front of the State House.

Scrapbook 46: State House and Grounds, volume 2 consists of images of interior and exterior shots of various iterations of the New Hampshire State House, both overall and detailed views. All are dated. There are two images of workers at their desks. See also Scrapbook 21.

Scrapbook 48: Businesses - Newspaper Clippings 1875-1956. Not all the items in this scrapbook are newspaper clippings; many are photographs, and all have been treated as Perry did

the photos, supplied with dates, addresses, and occasional additional information. There are a few images of store interiors with and without owners/employees posed.

Scrapbook 49: Businesses consists of images of all kinds of businesses, except factories. There are some shop interiors, and many photographs include the store owner and workers. All are dated and addresses given; occasionally the history of the store is also provided. Most images are late 19th and early 20th Century.

Scrapbook 50: Concord Celebrations - Winter Carnival 1895; Labor Day Parade; Sesquicentennial Parade 1914; Old Home Week 1899; Concord Trade Week 1896. These images are of parades and people marching in them or being carried on floats. All are dated, and some of the floats are described. There are also a few shots of stores decorated for the occasion. See also Scrapbooks 8, 10, and 38.

Scrapbook 52: Fires contains newspaper clippings about fires between 1957 and 1961, most with photographs of the flames.

Scrapbook 54: Concord in History, Newspaper Clippings consists of two clippings (1951 and 1955) about the Rolfe and Rumford Home on Hall and Water Streets and its destruction; the history of the Home (a home for girls at the time) is given. Two more clippings (1853) provide information on Franklin Pierce, including the death of Benjamin Pierce.

Scrapbook 55: Concord Horse Railroad; Concord Street Railroad; Concord Manchester Line consists of images about public transportation. Images are dated and the place taken identified. Some include the car or carriage driver/conductor.

Scrapbook 56: Holidays, Celebrations consists of three images of parades in 1886 and 1892 and one image of four men in an apothecary shop.

Scrapbook 57: 50th Anniversary, City of Concord; semi-centennial celebration. Despite the title, this group contains images of many parades in the early 20th Century (1903, 1904, 1915, 1916, 1918, 1926, 1927, and 1938). All are dated and some people are identified. There are crowd scenes, buildings with bunting, marchers, bands, and floats.

Scrapbook 62: Newspaper clippings, 1874-1936, Concord Newspapers. Despite the title, this group contains advertisements for an insurance company (Jackman & Lang) that feature old photographs, which are dated and identified.

Scrapbook 64: N.H. Historical Society. This group contains images of the New Hampshire Historical Society's "Old Home" on North Main Street. The undated images include interiors and exteriors of the building and provide a brief history on the ownership of the building. The New Hampshire Historical Society was in the "Old Home" from 1840 to 1912. The photographs in this scrapbook are not identified with a scrapbook number and have been placed here due to their content.

Scrapbook 65: N.H. Historical Society, laying the cornerstone, etc. This group contains images of the New Hampshire Historical Society's 30 Park Street building. The items include dated and undated images from 1909 to 1930 of the building's construction, grand opening, interior architecture and exhibitions, and exterior views. The photographs in this scrapbook are not identified with a scrapbook number and have been placed here due to their content.

George W. Perry miscellaneous photographs contain images without an identified scrapbook location. Most are dated, with locations or addresses given. When people are involved, they are usually identified; residential homes are often provided with a history of owners. When a building was later razed, the date and reason are given. There is also a series of images documenting an exhibit at the New Hampshire Historical Society in 1938 and of a parade, apparently of vehicles, that organization sponsored in 1957 to celebrate the Concord Coach.

Arrangement:

The photographs in this collection were cut out of their scrapbooks at an unknown date and filed into the photograph collection by subject. In 2015, they were retrieved from the subject files, sorted into groups that constituted the original scrapbooks, and placed in folders by scrapbook, when known.

The scrapbooks were originally numbered and titled; these numbers and titles have been used to create the order into which the folders are organized. Note, however, that the numbers are not consecutive, as some books contained non-photographic materials such as newspaper clippings. The arrangement of the images within the original scrapbooks is unknown.

The negatives in this collection were removed from the binder they were housed in and organized into folders in their original order. Most of these negatives are identified by a number, followed by the unnumbered negatives. Larger format negatives are located after these numbered negatives and are organized alphabetically.
