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## Free Public Lecture with New York Times Best-selling Author

CONCORD, NH – The New Hampshire Historical Society invites you to join *New York Times* best-selling author Kenneth C. Davis for a free public lecture, "Democracy Is Not a Spectator Sport: The Vital Role of Social Studies in Safeguarding Our Rights", in partnership with New Hampshire Humanities, the New Hampshire Council for the Social Studies, NHPR's Civics 101, and Gibson's Bookstore.

Creator of the popular *Don't Know Much About* series, Davis will be speaking on the importance of schools offering dynamic social studies instruction and ways in which the community can support education in this critical area. At the conclusion of the lecture, Davis will take questions from the audience and sign copies of his books.

The lecture will also preview the New Hampshire Historical Society's new free online social studies curriculum for upper elementary school students, entitled "Moose on the Loose: Social Studies for Granite State Kids."
