Abstract:

George W. Gordon of Suncook, NH, enlisted in 1861 in the 2nd New Hampshire Infantry Regiment and served for nearly three years until his death at the Battle of Cold Harbor, Virginia, on June 8, 1864. The papers consist of correspondence to his wife describing camp experiences, personal political opinions on the Civil War and Union commanders, reflections on the South, thoughts on battles in which he fought, and experiences serving on court martial duty. It also contains five money orders, two jury notices and seven envelopes.

Collection Overview

Biographical Information of George W. Gordon

George Washington Gordon was born on February 2, 1834 in Rockingham County, New Hampshire and as an adult resided in Allenstown and Suncook, New Hampshire. In May of 1861, he enlisted as a Sergeant Major in the 2nd New Hampshire Infantry Regiment and served with the regiment until his death at Cold Harbor, Virginia on June 8, 1864. In July, 1861, shortly after the First Battle of Manassas Junction, he was promoted to 2nd Lieutenant and later to 1st Lieutenant during the Peninsular Campaign in July of 1862. He achieved the rank of Captain in September, 1862, after the Second Battle of Manassas Junction. His regiment saw considerable action with the Army of the Potomac in Burnside's Brigade, as part of the 3rd Army Corps and with the 18th and 24th Army Corps. Gordon was wounded in battle at both the Second Battle of Manassas Junction and at Gettysburg, when the 2nd New Hampshire was overwhelmed in the Peach Orchard on July 3, 1863. He later served court martial duty and sentenced deserters. He decided to leave the army when his three year enlistment ended, but was killed at Cold Harbor before he could do so. He was survived by his wife Angeline Streeter Gordon and two

children, a daughter Willetta [referred to as Etta] and a son George. He is buried in Head's Cemetery, Hooksett, New Hampshire.

Collection Scope and Content Note:

The George W. Gordon Papers consist of correspondence, envelopes, money orders, and jury duty summonses. Most of the correspondence is from Gordon to his wife, but there is also one letter from the Confederate Secretary of War to President Jefferson Davis. The documents are all hand written. Some of the letters contain their original envelopes. This collection contains records representing the creator's Civil War experiences, his emotions, and information relating to his family and personal life.
