## JEREMIAH MASON PAPERS

(1796-1913)

Gift of John Chipman Gray, great-great-grandson of Jeremiah Mason, 1966. An earlier acquisition of Mason papers has been incorporated with this collection. There are now 530 items in two manuscript boxes.

Jeremiah Mason was born in Lebanon, Conn., April 27, 1768; graduated from Yale College, 1788; studied law for a year with Simeon Baldwin in New Haven, for two years with Stephen Row Bradley in Westminster, Vermont, and was admitted to the bar of Vermont and New Hampshire, 1791. He practiced law in Westmoreland and Walpole for a few years, then settled in Portsmouth in 1797. He married Mary Means, daughter of Robert Means of Amherst, in 1799. They had eight children, George Means, Mary Elizabeth, Alfred, James, Charles, Jane, Robert Means, and Marianne (Mrs. Francis B. Ellison).

Mason served as attorney general of New Hampshire, 1802-1805, and was president of the Rockingham County Bar for manyyears. He was a U.S. Senator, 1813-1816, and a representative to the New Hampshire legislature, 1820, 1821, and 1824. From 1828 to 1832 he was president of the Portsmouth Branch of the Bank of the United States. He then moved to Boston and lived there until his death, October 14, 1848.

The contemporaries of Jeremiah Mason considered him to be one of the great men of his time. Daniel Webster wrote of him, "If there be an the country a stronger intellect; if there be a mind of more native resources; if there be a vision that sees quicker, or sees deeper into whatever is intricate, or whatsquer is profound, I must confess I have not known it". He was an eminent lawyer (Justice Story dedicated his Commentaries on Douity Pleading to him), but he never became a judge. He was an uncompromising Federalish with little taste for political life, and so held few public offices. He did not write books or tracts. Consequently his influence on public affairs was indirect and impossible to record.

Robert Means Mason, son of Jeremiah, wanted to

preserve his memory for the benefit of his descendants. For this purpose he gave his father's correspondence and other materials to George S. Hillard, a lawyer and author who had known Jeremiah Mason in his later years, and requested him to prepare a Memoir. The present collection of papers appears to be what remains of this material.

George S. Hillard produced an excellent biography titled <u>Memoir and Correspondence of Jeremiah Mason</u>, privately printed in a limited edition in 1873.3 This volume contains Mason's autobiography of his life up to 1797, when he settled in Portsmouth, followed by selected correspondence illustrating Mason's life and character, linked together and explained by biographical material. Many family letters 2 te included as well as correspondence with Daniel Webster, Christopher Gore, Rufus King, Justice Story, and other well known men of the time. There is also an appendix giving the proceedings of the Suffolk County Bar in Massachusetts and the Rockingham County Bar in New Hampshire on the death of Jeremiah Mason, some reminiscences and anecdotes, the dedication to Jeremiah Mason by Joseph Story of his Commentaries on Equity Pleading, and biographical sketches of Jeremiah Mason's family and descendants.

The Mason Papers were used again by John Chipman Gray for his article on Jeremiah Mason in W.D. Lewis, Great American Lawyers, Vol.III (1907). There are penciled notes on the correspondence, "interesting", "not interesting now", "printed in Memoir", etc. made by Mr. Gray, and his typewritten copies of "interesting" letters are included in the present collection. Claude M. Feuss also used the papers for his article on Jeremiah Mason in the Dictionary of American Biography.

The Mason Papers contain some material which is printed in the Memoir along with much which was not printed. However, many of the letters printed in the Memoir are no longer in the collection, family letters as well as letters from prominent men. None of the printed correspondence with Daniel Webster, Christopher Gore, or Rufus King, and only one letter from Joseph Story, are now in the collection. The typewritten copies made by John Chipman Gray also include a number of letters for which there are no originals.

The collection consists principally of correspondence and more than one third of this is family correspondence. Much of it shows Mason's affection for his family and a concern for the education and morals of his children. But during his term in the senate, 1813-1817, he described the political scene in letters to his wife and to his brother-in-law, the Rev. Jesse Appleton, President of Bowdoin College. Mrs. Mason joined her husband during his last winter in Washington and wrote some entertaining letters to her sister in Amherst, Mrs. Caleb Ellis, describing Washington and the Wednesday evening "drawing room" of the "Queen", Mrs. Madison.

The papers are interesting for their comments on political affairs, both in the nation and in New Hampshire. Jeremiah Mason was interested in the Federalisk cause, banking, the judiciary, and events in general. From 1799 until 1828, he received official papers and documents, along with unofficial news, opinions and rumors from his New Hampshire friends in Congress, William Gordon, William Plumer, Thomas W. Thompson, William Plumer, Jr., John F. Parrott, and Samuel Bell. These concerned treaties, legislation, elections, appointments and other matters. He also received news from Senators John Williams of Tennessee, Robert H. Goldsborough of Maryland, David Daggett of Connecticut, and many other people.

Besides the letters of political interest there are business affairs, letters to Timothy Green, 1796-1797, concerning their land speculations, letters from legal clients, a few deeds, accounts with John Pierce, 1799-1817. There are a few letters concerning the Dartmouth College case, 1819, including one from Daniel Webster. There is correspondence with Nicholas Biddle, President of the Bank of the United States, and with others, 1828-1832, when Mason was president of the Portsmouth Branch. The correspondence dwindled both in volume and interest after Mason moved to Boston in 1832.

The collection also includes the wills of Jeremiah and Mary Means Mason and some family prayers; Mason's autobiography; his sketch of Judge Jeremiah Smith written for John H. Morrison, Smith's biographer, and a character sketch of Mary Means; a "Discourse on the Death of Jeremiah Mason", delivered in St. John's Church, Portsmouth by the Rev. Charles Burroughs; Resolutions adopted by the Bar of the County of Suffolk on the Occasion of the Death of Hon. Jeremiah Mason"; letters to Mrs. Mason after her husband's death; a few reminiscences by Mrs. Mason; lengthy

reminiscences by Arthur Livermore, Jr., U.S. Consul, Londonderry, Ireland, 1880-1903; anecdotes written and collected by Mason's daughter, Marianne Crafts Ellison; two preliminary drafts of C.M. Fuess' article on Jeremiah Mason in the <u>Dictionary of National Biography</u>.
